## FACTS

- Geese return to the area of their birth each year to mate and nest.
- Nesting season is mid March to May.
- Geese can fly up to 1,500 miles in a single day when migrating.
- Migrating geese will "pond hop" and forage for food.
- Mature Canada geese can weigh up to 14 pounds, with up to a 75-inch wingspan.
- Canada geese live around 10-25 years on average in the wild.
- Baby geese, called goslings will follow virtually anything that moves--dogs, ducks, and humans.
- Canada geese will violently attack anything that they sense as a threat to their goslings, including humans.
- Canada geese have a black neck and head, and a striking white "chinstrap" on the neck.



- Canada geese prefer nesting sites on elevated, secluded areas near bodies of water like lakes, streams, and ponds.
- Canada geese primarily eat green vegetation, grasses, aquatic plants, grains, and occasionally fish and insects.
- In urban areas, geese will pick food off of streets, out of garbage cans, and damage crops and fouling pastures with their waste.
- Migratory Bird Treaty Act of 1918 makes it illegal to intentionally capture, kill or disrupt Canada geese or the nests and eggs of such birds.
- Humane repellents and deterrents have proven successful in controlling geese.
